Income Opportunities and Enhanced Social Protection of Informal Migrant Workers Beyond COVID-19

Background

On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a pandemic, and the Vietnamese Government implemented nationwide travel restrictions and social distancing measures to minimize the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Ho Chi Minh City and Hanoi are two of the most heavily affected localities due to population density and the complexity of the epidemic.

Social distancing affects not only the lives but also the jobs of residents in cities. Female migrant workers in the informal sector, such as street vendors, domestic workers and garment workers, are among the most vulnerable groups in urban areas as they have lost part or all of their sources of income.

In May 2020, CARE and its partners conducted research to assess the impacts that COVID-19 could have on women, men, girls, boys and vulnerable groups in Vietnam, such as migrant workers in the informal sector, to understand their immediate and long-term challenges and needs.

The WODIMO project was built based on the main results from the above research and studies.

Objective

To support decent work for women migrant workers in the informal sector and to improve their access to social protection during and beyond COVID-19 pandemic

Outcome

Directly support 1475 women migrant workers

Outcome 1: Informal women migrant workers have increased digital income generation opportunities

Outcome 2: Improved social protection regulations for informal workers
